Where We've Come From

- Previous National Personal Transportation Surveys (NPTS)
 - 1969: 15,000 HH; Census
 - **1977**: 18,000 HH; Census
 - **1983**: 6,500; Census
 - **1990**: 18,000 national + 4,000 add-on; RTI
 - **1995**: 21,000 national + 21,033 add-ons; RTI

Where We've Come From

- 2001 National Household Travel Surveys (NHTS)
 - 26,038 national + 43,779 add-ons; Westat and Morpace
 - Complex pretesting;
 - RDD CATI survey;
 - Name change to NHTS combine NPTS and American Travel Survey

Where We've Come From

- 2009 National Household Travel Survey
 - 25,510 national + 124,637 add-ons; Westat
 - RDD CATI survey;
 - Dropped ATS module;
 - On-line geocoding of trip ends

Data Collection Methodology



Overview of Design

Address-Based Sample (ABS) frame

- Two-stage survey with mixed mode approach using mail, web, and telephone
- Pretest: November 2015 to January 2016
- Main Survey Start: March 2016

Sample Design

ABS


- Targeting 129,000 completed households
- 569 sampling strata (national + 13 add-on areas)
- Address sample is being selected in two equal-sized waves
 - Prior to start of fieldwork
 - About 6 months after the start of fieldwork
- Sampled addresses will be randomly pre-assigned a day of the week
- Sample release process balances assignment of travel days by month

Design of Survey Materials

- FHWA and Westat
 - Starting point 2009 NHTS materials
 - Revised based on best practices for a 2-stage ABS Survey
- Expert Panel Input in April 2015
 - Refine/Simplify invitation letter
 - Provide person-level guidance with travel log
- Cognitive Testing
 - Recruitment instrument and field materials in April 2015
 - Web retrieval instrument in December 2015

Recruitment Highlights

- Primarily by mail with periodic reminders
- Telephone recruitment option (if respondent requests it)
- Postcard invitation for web recruitment as a nonresponse option





Instructions:

Frequently Asked Questions

Should I take the travel log with me during my travel day?

Yes. Keep your travel log with you so that you can write down each place you go and exactly what time you arrive and leave. Then, use the log to help finish the survey online or by phone.

I just took a walk around my neighborhood. Do I need to include that?

Yes. Even if you end up back at the same place you started, it still counts. If you go for a walk in your neighborhood, record it as a trip from home to home.

I use public transit. Do I need to write down every bus stop or train station?

No. Just tell us where you went. We don't need to know each station, bus stop, or transfer point along the way. Simply list all the ways you got to that place (e.g., walk, bus, and train).

Do I need to count all the passengers on the bus?

No. We are only interested in how many people traveled with you. If you and a friend took a bus together, just tell us that one person went with you.

Do I need to mail you my log after the travel day is over?

No. We will ask you to refer to the travel log when you are completing the follow-up survey online or by phone, but the log itself is yours to keep.


Data Processing, Quality Assurance, and Control



QA/QC and Data Processing

- Extensive testing of instruments with real time checks and support systems
- Multiple post completion trip processing system checks
 - Review / verification by analysts
 - Re-contact with respondents
 - Re-run all checks

Real Time Checks



Nonresponse Avoidance

- Recruitment phase
 - sequence of contacts based on design principles for mail surveys laid out by Dillman, Smyth, and Christian (2009)

- Retrieval phase
 - primary data collection mode is web; reminders and nonresponse follow-up make use of other modes (email, text, and telephone)

Interim Recruitment Results as of 1/6/2016

 Sample size: 2,886 (50 states plus DC, Atlanta MPO area, and counties that comprise Tulsa, Oklahoma)

Recruitment Response Rate: 27%+
